Uuring 2012 Mackay City celebrated 150 years of settlement. The Zonta Club of Mackay also celebrated our 20th birthday and created our recipe

book Mackay: Past, Present & Future. Our club had the privilege of adding a copy of the recipe book to the Time Capsule that was buried at Greenmount Homestead at Walkerston on 11th November 2012. The capsule will be opened in 2062.

Zonta Foundation Contribution—Year ended 31 March 2013

Each Zonta Club has an obligation to support Zonta's International service projects, with a contribution of one-third of the funds raised during that year.

The money is sent to the Zonta International Foundation, which manages the distribution of all service funds.

Each club is able to direct their contribution to particular areas.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE FUND

Helping women in developing countries has been a passion of Zontians since the organization was founded in 1919. Today, Zonta's International Service Program continues to help women in developing countries improve their legal, political, economic, educational and health status. Through funding from the Zonta International Foundation, the Program has provided training, education, health, sanitation, agricultural and micro-credit assistance to women, primarily through projects implemented by the agencies of the United Nations and other recognized non-governmental organizations.

ZONTA INTERNATIONAL STRATEGIES TO END VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN PROGRAM (ZISVAW)

Globally, gender-based violence is the most pervasive and least recognized human rights violation. Rooted in inequality, it affects women of every race, class, culture, ethnicity, age and country. Zonta International strives to promote and protect the human rights of all women and girls and reduce the incidence of violence through the Zonta International Strategies to End Violence Against Women (ZISVAW) Program by:

Supporting prevention and advocacy strategies locally and internationally.

Awarding grants to United Nations agencies or recognized NGOs for projects that: seek to change personal and/or political knowledge, attitudes and behaviour contributing to gender-based violence.

Increasing awareness and actions related to preventing violence against women by: encouraging Zonta club involvement in local and national advocacy initiatives and service projects.

Since the program's inception in 1999, more than US\$2 million has been provided to support 40 projects in more than 23 countries.

During the 2012-2014 Biennium, three projects are being supported by the ZISVAW Fund:

Mass Communications with a Purpose: Global Partnership on Edutainment for Social

Funding: US\$802,124 to the UN Trust Fund, administered by UN Women

Safe Cities for Women in Honduras

Funding: US\$250,000 to UN Women (The United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and

the Empowerment of Women)

Empowering Women in Rural Samoa to Combat Violence

Funding: \$US109,876 to the UN Trust Fund, administered by UN Women

AMELIA EARHART FELLOWSHIP

Today, women remain a distinct minority in science and engineering, representing approximately 10 percent of professionals in these fields. The Amelia Earhart Fellowship program helps talented women, pursuing advanced studies in the typically male-dominated fields of aerospace-related sciences and engineering, achieve their educational goals. The Fellowship enables these women to invest in state-of-the-art computers to conduct their research, purchase expensive books and resource materials, and participate in specialized studies around the globe. Amelia Earhart Fellows have gone on to become astronauts, aerospace engineers, astronomers, professors, geologists, business owners, heads of companies, even Secretary of the US Air Force.

JANE M KLAUSMAN WOMEN IN BUSINESS SCHOLARSHIP

Women have made great strides in the pursuit of education, careers and leadership roles they were once denied; however, today, women are still more likely to be pouring the coffee in global boardrooms than sitting on the boards. In 2011, women held only 16.1% of the board seats at Fortune 500 companies according to the 2011 Catalyst Census. The Jane M. Klausman Women in Business Scholarship program helps women pursue undergraduate and master's degrees in business management and overcome gender barriers from the classroom to the boardroom.

YOUNG WOMEN IN PUBLIC AFFAIRS FUND

The progress of women in the last century has dramatically increased the opportunities available to women, yet women's participation in positions of public influence continues to lag behind. Although women account for nearly 50 percent of the workforce, they hold just 19.5 percent of seats in the world's national parliaments as of 31 December 2011, according to the Inter-Parliamentary Union. Zonta International believes young women are the key to women's advancement in the field of public service. The Young Women in Public Affairs (YWPA) Awards program recognizes young women for their demonstrated leadership skills and commitment to public service and civic causes and encourages them to continue their participation in public and political life.

ROSE FUND

The Rose Fund provides additional support to Foundation programs not fully supported by fund-specific contributions and enables the

MARGARET THATCHER

We women failed to follow her blazing trail

Margaret Thatcher came to power when I was 17 and studying for A-levels. Unlike a colleague who was a pupil at prestigious girls' school Downe House — where the news of her election was relayed at dawn by an excited housemistress ringing a handbell and shouting 'Girls! Girls! We have a woman prime minister!' — I don't recall anyone at my co-ed grammar school making a particular fuss about it.

At the time, I fancied myself a socialist, even a Marxist. This pose had far more to do with teenage rebellion — my parents were staunch Conservatives — than any proper understanding of politics.

With the arrogance of youth, my friends and I mocked her for her hectoring voice, her old-fashioned hair-style and her penchant for ironing. But she would prove to be a role model of such power that my generation of young women would be the first to believe that the world was ours for the taking. It didn't matter whether we loved her, loathed her or were broadly indifferent to her. The mere fact that she was there — handbagging Michael Heseltine one moment, bringing down the Iron Curtain the next — was enough to imbue us all with the not-so-subliminal message that women really could do anything. And the great tragedy for my daughter's generation is that not a single woman in public life comes close to providing such a role model today.

Worse still, in the 23 years since Mrs Thatcher left Downing Street — betrayed and ousted by a group of cowardly male Tory ministers who were desperate not to lose their seats — women have not just failed to progress, in some respects they've actually gone backwards.

Famous women on the average 17-year-old's radar today merely convey the message that it's crucial to remain thin and youthful for as long as you can.

Can you imagine Mrs Thatcher ever announcing she was on a gluten-free, high-protein diet, or boasting that she went to the gym every day? Is it conceivable that she would have countenanced using Botox or fillers to maintain her famously porcelain skin?

Of course not. Yet these are the antics we've come to expect nowadays from any woman in the public eye. Even the calm, collected Theresa May has succumbed to the siren call of the diet.

Mrs Thatcher was not without vanity — she always had immaculate hair and make-up — and was an accomplished flirt, as world leaders from Reagan to Gorbachev have testified.

Her attraction was not in her looks, however, but in her passion, intellect and principles. These are the qualities that held so many powerful men in thrall. As she told the Mail's Ann Leslie in her last year in power: 'Chemistry is not to do with looks, it's personality.'

According to the chattering-class elite — still spluttering with fury that a Grantham shop-girl had the temerity not only to think she could run the country but the courage and tenacity to do it — the lack of female power at the top of politics today is somehow Mrs Thatcher's fault.

They're wrong, of course — but they're still too busy traducing her to notice that they've missed the point. She blazed the trail: it was up to us to follow her lead. To our shame, we've singularly failed to do so.
