#### **Another reminder Ladies!**




With this newsletter, I send all our best hopes and good wishes to Wendy, Mandy and Laura who are representing us at the District 22 Conference. Many

#### THE POWER OF CHOICE

Life is a matter of choices. The Power of Choice, this 6 letter word, "*choice* " is a powerful word because of the rewards it avails us but really what is powerful, is the fact we can make a choice – any choice - good or bad.

We, women, in our western world, take the power of choice, for granted, from the day we are born to the day we die. We are making choices every day, from the time we wake up, to the time we hit the sack at night. Some of these are so routine we do not even stop to think, for instance the choice of what we eat, what we wear, what transport we use to go to

places, what job to apply for, who to live with, who to marry, have children, etc....

There will be moment where opportunities to exercise our Power of Choice coupled with our emotions will be tough. Yet, we are in control as we can make choices which will define us as a person.

The Power of Choice – Choice Overload – when we not cannot cope with the many options which are plenty.

And yet, in some countries I visited a few months ago, women, not through lack of awareness though, have been denied the Power of Choice.

How can these discriminated human beings make decisions, never presented with options, deprived of their right to free choice, deprived of their right to travel, to marry and have a private life, deprived from leaving home without their husbands' permission, deprived to their right to divorce, to choose their occupation, deprived of their full right of testimony in the courts, deprived of their full right of inheritance, the list is long, very long, quite exhaustive, but the most pervasive of all, women are deprived of their free choice of clothing,


Not allowed to choose their clothes to suit their tastes, their shapes, their age, and needs, they saw their room for choice being narrowed, by their government, to pieces of clothing, the most liberal being an overcoat and a scarf, as to conceal their body shape.

Although I have no intention to enter the debate about whether a veil, a headscarf is a religious requirement, I would like to point out that some members of our society at present consider it as asserting their identity, at dispelling the conception of women body exposure equals liberation, the polemic is fierce and yet ultimately, what are they doing,...Zontians, they are exercising **their power of choice** –

# Advocacy report from the Inter-District Brisbane Convention



Hello Everyone.

Wendy, Laura and I had a fantastic time at the convention. We were lucky enough to have our International President and 2 International Board members attend along with 820 fellow Zontians from New Zealand and Australia. Also, a Canadian Zontian! New Zealand was well represented with over 160 members. All clubs were represented for the first time and it was the first time in 30 years that New Zealand and Australia have all come together. The atmosphere was electric, and the collective brain power was overwhelming and inspira-

tional.

Friday was our District 22 voting and meeting. Our new District board has been voted in without issue, our AGM was held, and a couple of amendments were made to our Bylaws



and Resolution report. Can view these on the District 22 website.

We should all be proud as our club was awarded the District winner for our Advocacy Project "Whitsunday Festival of Motoring and Domestic and Family Violence Prevention Showcase" as part of the Share our Story. I was able to present our showcase to our 220 fellow district members from our 44 clubs. Honestly, I was relieved I didn't have to present it to 820 members! It was a very humbling experience.

What I didn't know at the time, after a few people came up to me afterwards with their story was, other clubs had already heard about the showcase, not because they heard it through Zonta avenues and newsletters but members of the public had thanked them for what Zonta did in the Whitsundays when they attended the festival. Other club mentioned wanting to do a similar thing but were unsure how to initiate the process, they are now progressing with their club's project proposals.

Other news from the District meeting:

- Dues are to remain at \$30 annually.
- Next AGM is to be held on the 5<sup>th</sup> of September 2020.

- New Club currently being chartered in Biloela. 18 members already showing interest in the new club.
- Currently we have 16 Z Clubs in our district and the focus is on Golden Z Clubs for our universities.
- Australia is the 2<sup>nd</sup> biggest category for young professional scholarship nominations after the US
- District 22 Centennial Anniversary award went to Commissioner Katarina Carroll, Qld Police. She will be presented with the Dianne Leggo Honour Roll award at a later stage. Unfortunately, she was unable to attend as

she was called to Townsville.

The opening ceremony was something to behold and beyond words. You could sense and witness the 100-year tradition in the Flag parade ceremony which officially opened the conference. The welcoming traditional dances from Australia and New Zealand were entertaining, steeped in tradition and we all felt very welcome indeed. The keynote speaker Dame Therese Walsh had us laughing, crying and standing in respect in a standing ovation. Certainly, felt like I already had my money's worth but that was just day 1!

Day 2 was even more impressive for this first-time attendee, hosted by District 22 & 23. It was mentioned our combined 134 clubs have over 3000 members. Dame Quentin Bryce was wonderfully interviewed by our very own Governor Sandy Venn-Brown. She mentioned how she thought Zonta was the forefront of information and engaged in our community. She also felt Zonta was a sisterhood of solidarity and friendship. The "Not Now, Not Ever" report and rec-

ommendations were crucial for human rights and when she was asked to work on it, she stepped up to the opportunity and felt Zonta has the same attitude. "When asked you have to say yes, then work out how".

The district Service showcase winner and overall district winner was Zonta Ipswich, who shared their story about helping the refugees in their area. They located the women through schools as the hubs were discretely placed and offered funds towards things they need. However, once they established the

connection, they didn't want money, they wanted skills and to learn English. The connection

not only enabled Zonta to empower these women with education and skills but brought them all together with lifelong friendships. It was a very inspirational story.

Our international President Susanne Von Bassewitz was amazing. I think we were all in



awe of her. She showcased 2 International Projects, Jordon and Zambia. She also spoke of sisterhood and the importance of education to empower young women.

The advocacy presentation had me reflecting on the challenge of the "next 100 years" and how Zonta and our club can leave a legacy and mentorship for our next generations. Our young Professor guest speakers, YWPA and JMK winners certainly made me feel rather inadequate after learning of their accomplishments and wondering what I had done with my life. Finally, the Global Project of "Ending Child Marriage" was the last discussion, closing the event. Very heartbreaking information but a project well worthy of our united global commitment for change. I will put all this and more into a full report as I could talk for days.

In conclusion, the overall theme of the whole event seemed to be, not only celebrating the past 100 years but focusing on the next 100 years. What worked in the past doesn't always work for the future. How is our district and clubs going to stay relevant in the next 100 years? Food for thought??? Oh, and I almost forgot! The Cocktail Party and Gala Dinner were beyond expectations and the perfect opportunity to meet fellow Zontians, glam up a little and make new friends. By the end of the conference my head was full of ideas and projects however I think some brainstorming sessions might be in order.


No Hyperk

## **Advocacy Spotlight**

It is with great pleasure that I can share with you news of my recent, 8<sup>th</sup> trip to the Lirhanzo Children's Village, situated in a remote area of Zimbabwe.

Most of you know I have been supporting this village, founded by Ezelle a white farmer's wife and displaced landowner and her amazing off sider Margret for 15 years through AFADU. I have proudly served on the AFADU Board for 10 of those years as

Sponsorship Director.

With shipping connections, AFADU started out by sending containers of desperately needed aid, then raised funds to help build the Village infrastructure. As support gathered, we found sponsorship for the children and ongoing top up salaries for 2 local doctors to ensure they would stay at the 160-bed local hospital. We then fundraised for many other

projects including Stage 1 of the Primary School, opened in 2017. This was initially built to just educate our orphans but is now packed to the gunnels with 250 kids from the local community.

This year out trip was special because it was AFADU Chairman, Ian Routledge's first.

Ian had been involved since 2002 but had never met the kids or seen where everything slotted into place. We took along Leanne Abbott who had set up the Sewing Scholarship program in 2015 plus local Whitsunday ladies Wendy Davidson and Mel Deacon who both have very close Zimbabwean connections.

We journeyed for 3 days to a country that has so many challenges. Unstable government, no electricity, no jobs, a monetary system that doesn't work, and water supply to the major cities about to run out, just to name a few! The positives, however, are the Zimbabwean people who refuse to give up and the little miracle of our community which is thriving because of our efforts.



Education is the key and AFADU have put through university a veterinarian, 3 school teachers, (one now acting as head master at the school) a banker, now doing his Mas-

ters and presently we are sponsoring 3 girls who are at various stages of their University degrees. Egneta, who ZONTA helped educate completed her degree last year and now has an excellent



job in South Africa. One of our lads, after completing his motor mechanics course, now runs his own garage and many others are doing tertiary courses at technical schools.

Last year, through my amazing connection with Melbourne man Mark Edmonds after appearing on Hot Seat we went on to establish the LCV commercial garden which not only feeds our own children but people in the surrounding community. There is plenty left over produce to sell and once we complete our next project, a solar pump to pump the water from the Mwenezi River to the orphanage garden and school, we will no longer have issues with money to buy diesel. We can then plant the next two thirds of the garden which will move the community so much closer to sustainability.



I have been blessed, and in 15 years I have seen so much cultural change. The horrific local practice of Khomba, to ready girls at puberty for a life as a wife is now openly discouraged at our school. Parents and elders attend meetings, where the huge monetary value of a girls education, compared to an early marriage and a life of producing up to 12 babies is

openly discussed and passed on by the teachers.

I have also been blessed to develop close relationships with these incredibly grateful chil-

dren who understand how lucky they are and treasure the opportunities they have been given. As they grow in this nurturing community, they understand how change for all Zimbabweans must happen.

They are up for it and I just hope I will be around to
